History Walk Orientation Map Site 1

In the mid-19th century, Lebanon bought several horse-drawn hearses for use in different parts of town. The town then built sheds or "hearse houses" to protect these vehicles.

Hearse houses stood at several cemeteries including Goshen, Center and probably Liberty Hill.

The Exeter hearse house is the only example remaining on its original site. This replica of the Exeter hearse house was built as an Eagle Scout project by Connor Montgomery.

The hearse house holds a restored 19th century hearse once used in Lebanon, pictured above.
